Ms. Kinney reported an average month for vital record reports, stating many marriage licenses. She also noted she would be interviewing vendors for voter registration systems and equipment. Chairman Brunk asked if Ms. Kinney saw the project coming in as allocated. She stated she was hopeful but an RFP had not been sent yet.

Mr. Vandersnick informed the committee he would be retiring on December 8th after 32 and a half years with the Probation Department and stated it was a pleasure working with the Board, and thanked everyone. A successor had not been appointed yet.

The committee congratulated Mr. Vandersnick on his upcoming retirement.

Chairman Brunk stated contractors would be wrapping up and Living Lands and Waters would be on-site to plant trees donated and grass seed would be laid for spring growth. He touched on an item for the purchase of benches for the courthouse square.

Mr. Davis stated he was requesting a name change to the Information Systems Department to Information Technology. He stated the name was last changed in 1998 and he wanted to change it to "IT."

University of IL Ext. Educator Russell Medley reported to the committee on the monthly newsletter highlight disaster preparedness and planning as well as the Floricente Community Garden serving more than 150 families. He mentioned poverty simulations would be held in the spring and fall. He also stated the organization was hiring a Community Outreach worker for Snap-Ed in Milan, starting wage \$15.78 full time with very good benefits

Consider Ordinance Establishing a PACE Area and the Illinois Finance Authority Property Assessed Clean Energy Program for Economic Development

Mr. Grafton presented to the committee on the PACE ordinance as a financing tool for developers to finance eligible projects related to energy use; he stated the advantage is a lower interest rate, lower costs to bonding and longer terms than conventionally available. He noted the County would have no financial obligation or responsibility. The ordinance would blanket all of Rock Island County covering Moline, East Moline and other municipalities. He stated Mr. Doug House with IL Finance Authority would speak at the Committee of the Whole. He stated Peoria and Tazwell Counties had adopted the ordinance.

Mr. McNeil asked if the ordinance would be in place for a period of time; Mr. Grafton stated he did not know about a sunset clause. Mr. McNeil stated it looked like a very smart tool. Mr. Mielke asked if other stated had used this and looked to see if a success rate could be determined. Mr. Grafton was unsure.

Proclamation for Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month January 2024

Whereas, the United States was founded upon the principle that all people are created with the inalienable right to freedom, and added the 13th Amendment to the Constitution making slavery illegal; and

Whereas, slavery within the United States today is most often found in the form of forced labor and sex trafficking, which weakens our social fabric, increases violence and organized crime, and debases our humanity; and

Whereas, this heinous crime is found within our own community; and

Whereas, the Iowa Network Against Human Trafficking and Slavery has been working since 2005 to abolish all forms of human trafficking through education, prevention, volunteerism, advocacy and collaboration; and

Whereas, even though awareness of this crime is growing, human trafficking continues to go unreported due to its isolating nature, the misunderstanding of its definition, and the lack of awareness about its indicators; and

Whereas, increased community education on how to identify victims of human trafficking along with increased knowledge of local resources and services for those affected by these criminal actions can help restore freedom and dignity to identified survivors, as well as help diminish the number of future victims; and

Whereas, every business, community organization, faith community, family and individual can make a difference by choosing products that are not made by forced labor; by working to protect our young people from sexual exploitation; by addressing the problem of internet sex trafficking and pornography; and by becoming more aware of the problem and possible solutions; and

Now, Therefore, I _____, Mayor of the City of _____, Iowa, do hereby proclaim the month of January 2024 as Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, and encourage all our citizens to become more informed on this growing problem, to be vigilant and report suspicious activity, and to work towards solutions to end trafficking in all its forms in our community. JANUARY 2024

WHEREAS, January is National Mentoring Month: an annual campaign to raise awareness of and celebrate the powerful impact of mentoring relationships, recruit new mentors, and encourage institutions to integrate quality mentoring into their policies, practices; and

WHEREAS, ROCK ISLAND COUNTY recognizes the contributions of volunteer mentors, who link youth to economic and social opportunity, while also strengthening our community; and

WHEREAS, mentoring programs like Big Brothers Big Sisters of the Mississippi Valley make our state and communities stronger by enabling impactful relationships that provide invaluable support networks; and

WHEREAS, youth development experts agree that mentoring encourages positive youth development and smart daily behaviors, such as finishing homework and having healthy social interactions, and has a positive impact on the growth and success of a young person; and

WHEREAS, mentoring programs generally have a significant, positive impact on youth academic achievement, school connectedness and engagement, and educational success, which can lead to outcomes such as improved attendance, grades, and test scores, and classroom behavior; and

WHEREAS, mentors can help young people set career goals, and can help connect mentees to industry professionals to train for and find jobs; and

WHEREAS, effective mentoring of underserved and vulnerable populations of young people helps them confront challenges and enjoy improved mental health and social-emotional well-being; and

WHEREAS, mentoring programs have been found to positively impact many aspects of mental wellbeing, including reducing unhealthy coping mechanisms, improving interpersonal relationships, and reducing parental stress; and

WHEREAS, young people with a mentor are more likely to enroll in college, to participate in sports or extra-curricular activities, to hold a leadership position in a club or sports team, and to volunteer regularly, and less likely to start using drugs;

WHEREAS, mentoring is an innovative, evidence-based practice and, uniquely, is both a prevention and intervention strategy that can support young people of all demographics and backgrounds in all aspects of their lives; and

WHEREAS, despite the benefits of mentoring, one young person of every three is growing up without a mentor, which means a third of the youth of the United States are growing up without someone outside of the home to offer real life guidance and support; and

WHEREAS, this "mentoring gap" demonstrates the need for collaboration among the private, public, and nonprofit sectors to increase resources for relationship-centric supports for youth in communities, schools, and workplaces;
